



## THE PROBLEM

The kitchen was dark and didn't connect with the rest of the downstairs

### THE SOLUTION

'Our kitchen was not only in dire need of an update but the space didn't feel connected to the rest of the house. We decided to update the kitchen, then the plans became more extensive. The space was not straightforward - the

staircase is in the centre of the house, which we didn't want to move, and our patio was small. My brother-in-law architect Martin Bradley (@martin. bradley123) suggested a window seat and skylights on either side of the house. With the new space worked out it was time to

think about the kitchen. I'm an interiors stylist (@emma fishman\_stylist) so I loved thinking about the style. I had my eye on Bert & May's Shift tiles combined with dramatic black units. The London Kitchen Company designed the wood grain doors, and a green striped floor adds extra interest.'

Two-tone rattan pendants, £154 each, Maisons du Monde RIGHT Martin Bradley, the architect, designed the window seat in iroko wood, to create a lovely place to relax with shelving for cookbooks underneath. The cushions are covered in Emma's favourite fabric to add more pattern.


